












TD Learning Naturally

REWILDING THROUGH RESTORATION



ReWilding Through Restoration is a program that encourages the regeneration of natural ecosystems within Fish Creek Provincial Park, allowing current and future generations of Albertans to reconnect with, and wonder at, Alberta's natural beauty.

- ReWilding Through Restoration involves actions like the planting of poplars and other native vegetation along the banks of Fish Creek in areas that have become degraded by human activity.
- ReWilding Through Restoration serves to accelerate the natural processes along the creek, positively influencing the overall watershed health as vegetation quickly begins to grow and balance the system.
- Friends of Fish Creek volunteers take part in the planting, maintenance and monitoring of the ReWilding Through Restoration sites until the sites are fully established.
- ReWilding Through Restoration is only possible with the hands on support of volunteers and through donations that allow us to purchase the necessary supplies and equipment to make it happen.

DON'T BE A GLITTER BUG!

While out on the park's trails scanning the forest understory for birds and wildflowers, you may see something shimmering at you from among the leaf litter. Nope, it's not a bird or bug. It's evidence of celebrations and it's causing a problem for the park's ecosystems! This spring we have noticed an increase in micro-litter in the park, such as glitter, confetti and popped balloons. Balloons, streamers, confetti and glitter

may add visual flare to your event, but these small bits of plastic are difficult to clean up, do not biodegrade and eventually find their way into waterways. Made up of fossil fuels and other chemicals, these miniscule pieces of plastic can attract bacteria and other contaminants which can then harm the unsuspecting wildlife that see it as a

tasty treat!



Occupational Health and Safety

SAFETY IS A TOP PRIORITY FOR FRIENDS OF FISH CREEK

If you've ever been on one of our stewardship outings or volunteer training sessions, you know that the Friends of Fish Creek value safety, especially the safety of our Volunteers. We take safety seriously and have had safety documentation and practices in place for many years.

Last fall, there was a serious incident involving a Volunteer on Public Lands west of Calgary. At that time, a Stop Work Order (SWO) was established for high risk activities on Public Lands to allow time for investigation and taking steps to help prevent another serious incident in the future.

This spring, the Friends of Fish Creek was notified of a Stop Work Order involving all voluntary activities in Provincial Parks and Public Lands across the province, including low and medium risk work done by Friends of Fish Creek Volunteers. At that point, we were directed to submit safety documents using the Alberta Parks' format for approval so the SWO could be lifted and volunteers could get back to work.

The SWO came during our busiest time of the year,

while Friends staff were actively recruiting, training and equipping volunteers for various programs, such as Park Watch, for which training had already taken place and scheduled shifts were slated to begin the following day.

Although the Order meant cancelled training sessions and volunteer shifts for dozens of volunteers over a two-week period, it also gave Friends staff the time and mental space to focus our energies on transitioning our existing safety documentation into the required Alberta Parks' format. In the end, it was a fun, team-building experience that resulted in new Safe Working Practice documents that have now been incorporated into our *Volunteer Handbook* as well as a few new changes to help ensure everyone is stays safe while volunteering in Fish Creek Provincial Park. All in all, it was a worthwhile experience.

What's the same?

- Volunteers will always be encouraged to take First Aid, though it is not a requirement.
- Volunteers in some programs will still be required to carry First Aid kits while on shifts.
- Volunteers will still be required to take part in safety orientation at our "tailgate talks" before work begins on stewardship outings.

What's new?

- Volunteers will now be Friends of Fish Creek Volunteers, no longer Alberta Parks Volunteers.
- All FoFC Volunteers now need to read the Friends of Fish Creek Volunteer Handbook and acknowledge it on MyVolunteerPage before being able to sign up for Volunteer shifts.

- Once you have read it, log into MyVolunteer-Page https://app.betterimpact.com/Login/ VolunteerNoSearch
- Then click on MY PROFILE > Qualifications to acknowledge that you have read and understand the *Handbook*.
- Stewardship Volunteers now need to sign the safety document at the start of each stewardship

outing (weed pulls, restoration, tree wrapping, clean up), acknowledging that they understand the potential hazards and that they will wear all required personal protective equipment while volunteering.

There may be more changes "coming down the pipe" in terms of volunteer involvement in the park and we will do our best to keep our community in the loop along the way. In the end, our goal remains the same: To engage the community through education and awareness to conserve a truly unique naturalized urban park.

Summer 2018 Tour Schedule

EXPANDED TOUR PROGRAMS FOR 2018!

For many years, the Friends have offered educational park tours to engage the public and share important and sometimes little known facts and history about Fish Creek Provincial Park. In fact, our Minibus and walking tours are some of our most popular programs. In the past, we have relied on volunteer experts in particular areas to offer these tours; while

this worked well, we have always known - and experienced first hand - that when those volunteers were no longer available, neither were the tours. With this in mind, we have worked hard to research and develop new tours over the past year and find ways to record and transcribe some of our old tours so that we have this information written down and available for the future.

We also developed a formal volunteer Tour Guide and Tour Assistant training program so we have more people skilled in tour delivery. All of this means that we will be able to reach more people through our tour programming, creating the kinds of connections that help people understand the importance of the park landscape, the issues that impact its sustainability and encouraging them to be better stewards of the land. Here is a quick look at what we have to offer this year!

Walking Tours:

History and Nature - These tours will take you back in time to learn about the First Nations, Metis and European settlers who lived in the area before the City of Calgary developed and grew to what it is today.

ReWilding Through Restoration - Flooding events and the negative impact of park visitors venturing off designated pathways have serious implications for the

health of the Fish Creek watershed. This tour takes you to visit the Friends' riparian restoration sites to see the important work being done by volunteers that combats these issues and contributes to increased ecosystem health.

Alien Invasion: Native and Invasive Plants of Fish Creek Provincial Park - Learn about the

importance of native plants, how their existence is threatened by the continued spread of invasive plants, how this has come to be and what we can do about it.

Ghosts of Fish Creek - Our most popular tour of the year, this one sells out early! Enjoy a short walk around the Bow Valley Ranch and learn about the area's haunted history!

Minibus Tours:

Photography in the Park - Learn the finer points of photography for DSLR or point and shoot cameras.

Archaeology in the Park: Finding the Pioneers - Hear stories about the first European settlers in the Fish Creek Valley and how we have pieced together evidence through what they left behind to learn about what life would have been like in the late 1800s.

Fish Creek Bird Blind

BIRDING IN FISH CREEK JUST GOT BETTER

Fish Creek Provincial Park is home to over 200 different bird species, ranging from the ever-present chickadee to sandpipers, blue herons and even pelicans. Birding is one of the most popular activities in the park, and birding enthusiasts come from all around the city for opportunities to catch a glimpse or photo of whatever they are lucky enough to see. This year, a new addition to the park will contribute to the already amazing birding experience in the park!

Several years ago, the Friends were approached by naturalist Gus Yaki, the lead volunteer of our popular Birding Course, about the possibility of building a bird blind in the park. These structures are seen in many city and provincial parks and provide places for people to "hide" and watch birds without disturbing them, so the birds are less likely to be scared away. Traditional blinds are small buildings with four walls, a roof and lateral viewing windows, but these designs did not meet the criteria set out for us by Alberta Environment and Parks for this project. So, we did some research to find a design that would meet these criteria:

- The structure could not be made of wood (due to flammability)
- It should not be climbable (for safety reasons)
- It could not be enclosed by walls or have a roof (could encourage people to set up camp).

We located a design used at the East Point Bird Sanctuary in Toronto. Our blind was built over the winter and erected in March; it can be found in the east end of the park near the Burnsmead wetlands. It is a



steel structure that functions as a blind but is also quite unique-looking, bringing a bit of "art" to the park. Its location was chosen after consultation with our birding community, as was the number, size and location of viewing windows; there are eight windows at varying heights, the lowest of which are at a height suitable for young children, viewers who may want to bring a folding chair and sit for a while, or those who use a wheelchair. Signage for the structure is currently in development.



If you are going to visit the blind, we ask that you park in the Burnsmead lot and walk east, parallel to the road, to reach it. It is against Park regulations to park along the roadway. Also, please remember - no matter how enticing it might be to do so it is also illegal to feed wildlife in a Provincial Park, and this includes birds. Like all of our projects, this was a true group effort and partnership made possible through consultation and collaboration.

Our thanks to Steve Sozniuk of Refining MetalWorks for his technical and creative skill in building this new structure, our Birding Communities for their input and direction related to the final design decisions and to Alberta Environment and Parks for their partnership and openness to this less than traditional blind design. Finally, this project would not have been possible without the generous financial support provided by Nature Calgary.

We'll also be offering a handful of plein-air painting workshops in June, July and August. These workshops are perfect for any level of painter, from new to experienced, and are a great way to enjoy the beauty of the park.



Wellness Program Kick-Off Event - Thursday, June 28 from 7:00 - 8:30 pm. Take part in this "combo class" where you'll get to try a bit of yoga, Spring Forest Qi Gong and meditation, and meet the instructors that will teach these sessions through the summer.

Yoga in the Park - these sessions will move to Tuesday nights (previously held on Wednesday evenings) between July 3 to August 28 from 7:00 - 8:30 pm. We are grateful to Naomi Parker and Gwen Draude for their continued commitment as instructors in this program over the past several years.

Spring Forest Qi Gong - these sessions will move from their original Monday evening schedule to Tuesdays between July 3 to August 28 from 9:30 - 10:30 am. Join Diane Smith, in her third year as a Wellness Program instructor, for these beautifully energizing and balancing sessions.

AUTUMN BIRDING COURSE

14 Week Autumn Birding Course, Monday, September 3, 2018 to Sunday December 9, 2018.



Autumn is one of the best times of year for birding. Between September and December, you can see, hear and learn about more than 150 bird species. As the leaves drop off the trees in the cooler months, many of the smaller migratory birds will be much easier to see. Outings are conducted by Gus Yaki, a lifelong naturalist who has birded around the world - and other experienced instructors. All birding course sessions are held in the great outdoors - in Fish Creek Provincial Park and other natural areas within Calgary.

The City of Calgary Wildlife

Where the WILD THINGS ARE HARNESSING THE POWER OF CITIZEN SCIENCE

Have you ever wondered who lives in Calgary's natural area parks? Have you ever wandered through Bebo Grove or Mallard Point and seen a deer trotting by? Would you like to know how you can learn more about our wild neighbors and participate in a citywide citizen science program?

Calgary is well known for its park system, which supports diverse habitats, creates social and recreational opportunities for Calgarians, and provides ecosystem benefits such as clean water, and erosion and flood control. The riparian habitat corridors throughout the city's parks allow wildlife to live and move around the city; however, habitat fragmentation from urban growth presents an ever-increasing threat to maintaining healthy wildlife populations. There is also limited information available regarding the species that inhabit our city and urban parks.

Recognizing this, in 2017 Calgary Parks adopted citizen science as a tool for The City of Calgary to inspire Calgarians to participate in citywide biodiversity stewardship action. The citizen science program, Calgary Captured, aims to assess the terrestrial mammal diversity of Calgary with the goal of enhancing citizen eco-literacy through participatory stewardship action.

Since May 2017, over sixty remote motion-activated cameras have been installed throughout the largest natural areas within the city, including Fish Creek Provincial Park. The remote cameras are placed to capture images of medium and large sized mammals, such as cougar, bobcat, coyote, fox, bear, deer, moose and elk, which depend on intact wildlife corridors to move throughout the landscape. Data retrieved through the cameras will influence conservation and management decisions about

Calgary's open spaces.

Fish Creek Provincial Park is unique because it is the only provincial park within the City of Calgary, it is the second largest urban park in Canada, and it has a



wide variety of flora and fauna not seen in other local natural areas. Fish Creek Provincial Park is working with The City of Calgary to ensure this large green space in the city is not excluded from this study.

Calgary Captured was launched in January 2018. This program offers Calgarians a novel way to peek into our local parks and classify species caught on camera. Through citizen participation our first season of images (120,000 images from May to July 2017) were reliably classified in only 51 days. Our second season of images (August to October 2017) were scheduled to be ready for classification in late May.

The remote cameras will remain in Fish Creek Provincial Park and other Calgary natural areas long term, providing valuable insight into where and how animals are moving throughout the city.
