WINTER BIRDING COURSE

January 7 - March 31, 2019

Learn about the variety of bird species in Fish Creek Provincial Park and other natural areas within Calgary through the Friends of Fish Creek Winter Birding Course. In the winter months, birds are much easier to see since the deciduous trees have shed their leaves, there are fewer species present and they often occur in flocks. "In fact, there may well be more individual birds within Calgary during the winter than in the summer months," said lifelong naturalist Gus Yaki, who, along with other experienced birding instructors, conducts these outings as a fundraiser for the Friends of Fish Creek.

Registration Required and fees apply. \$60 for Friends members and \$100 for non-members. \$5 for a youth 16 or younger with a registered adult.

THE JOBBER'S HOUSE AT THE BOW VALLEY RANCH

RENOVATION TO SUPPORT FRIENDS' GROWTH AND EXPANSION

The 100 year old house that stands next to our office in Fish Creek Provincial Park has remained empty since the late 1950s. This is the Jobber's House. This building was part of the ranch upgrades carried out by Patrick Burns in 1918, and is one of only three buildings remaining

from the Burns period, a significant time for the ranching industry in Canada.

This house has been part of the charm of Fish Creek Provincial Park for three generations and community members constantly tell us how much the building means to them. The Friends of Fish Creek is in growth mode and we require additional space to develop our social enterprise programs, add staff and respond to the demand for our programs and support to the community and other non profits.

We are proposing to take over and renovate and repurpose the Jobber's House to support our growth, further support our community, provide a facility to serve as a hub for less established non-profit groups and ensure the survival of this piece of Calgary's history.

In order to raise funds for the actual upgrades and repurposing we need a plan from a qualified individual supporting the feasibility of the project and outlining the steps to complete it and a cost estimate.

After some discussions in the early part of the year and support from local MLAs Richard Gotfried and Graham Sucha we are very happy to announce that the Alberta



Real Estate Foundation has provided a grant to cover the full cost of the feasibility study and project plan. Their generous contribution of \$44,000 will go a long way in getting this project off the ground.

The plan will take around three months to complete, once we have this, we will

be able to commence fundraising for the actual construction work. After discussions with supporters and potential funders, we estimate the major fundraising will take around a year to complete.

The current idea is to convert the upstairs to one large versatile room to support many functions, the downstairs will contain a smaller meeting space and possibly office space, the basement will contain utilities, washroom and office space. The exterior will be renovated but will maintain the same appearance. We are considering adding a classroom to the rear of the building to increase its utility; this will be constructed in keeping with the current exterior.

The work will include bringing the building up to current code and accessibility requirements and using energy and water conserving technologies. Our sincere thanks to the AREF for supporting the Jobber's House Renovation and the Friends look forward to sharing our progress on this exciting project.

VOLUNTEERS IN PROFILE

ROSE, WILL, KAREN AND MICHAEL RATLIFFE - WORKING TOGETHER FOR THE FUTURE OF THE PARK

The Ratliffe family has been volunteering with the Friends of Fish Creek since 2015 and contributed to almost all of our programs and events over the past 3 years. Rose, Will, Karen and Michael have each given their time and efforts to volunteering with some or all of the following programs - Park Watch, flood debris



mapping and clean ups, Riparian Restoration,
Monitoring and Assessment, Tree Wrapping, Wellness
programs, Weed Whackers, special events, Cookhouse
renovations, the Casino fundraiser, trail maintenance,
and willow harvesting. While there are many couples
and families who volunteer with the Friends, the time
and commitment put forth by the Ratliffe family is truly
astounding and we are very grateful for their ongoing
support. In addition to their volunteer efforts, Will, who
works in the environmental group at Husky Energy,
recently helped secure funds from Husky to support
Friends of Fish Creek environmental sustainability
programs. The Ratliffes recently took some time to
answer a few questions and share their experiences

"We feel very fortunate to have a little slice of nature to share with our kids so close to home," Rose said, "Fish Creek Provincial Park became our extended backyard for when we couldn't escape the city but needed some nature."

with the readers of the Voice of Friends.

Since moving from Manitoba and settling near Votier's Flats in 2003, Rose and Will have regularly visited Fish Creek, and have many memories of bringing Michael and Karen to the park when they were younger.

"Votier's holds a lot of family memories for us," Will said, "Like the time one Christmas when we went for a winter walk with a very little Karen, who was galloping her hobby horse. The toy horse was singing 'I'm a little pony, such a pretty pony.....' and that song is still stuck in our heads. More recently, I recall skiing up the

creek on a -30°C New Years Eve just last year. The park was just beautiful."

"Watching beavers is always entertaining," Rose said, "It took years before Karen actually saw a beaver. We would point out dams, lodges and ponds, but if there was a beaver to see, she would miss it. I think she was starting to think that beavers were make believe until we watched one swimming upriver through trees during the flood in 2009. It was an amazing experience to share." Speaking of wildlife in the park, "Cougar and lynx prints in the winter are always interesting," Will said, "while we have not actually seen a cougar or a lynx, we keep looking and hoping to see one."

As Park Watch Stewards and Park Watch Supply Coordinators, Rose, Will, Karen and Michael have been able to explore Fish Creek, see the area in a new way, and learn about the issues facing the park. "My favourite volunteer experience has been the Park Watch program and completing the supply runs," Michael said, "because it involves spending time in Fish Creek, interacting with park visitors and helping out in a way that doesn't feel like work." Rose added, "One thing we quickly discovered as Park Watch Stewards was how little we knew of the park, and we keep discovering new spots and hidden gems."

"I think that volunteering in the park was part of what helped me decide that I wanted to go into environmental science," said Karen, who is currently studying Environmental Management at Lakehead University in Thunder Bay. "Volunteering with the Friends, and with other groups working in the park has definitely provided experience with projects like riparian restoration to help me be sure that I will enjoy some of what I may do in my future career." "My time volunteering has helped me to know I'm interested in working with nature." Michael added, "It has also recently helped me to take on a leadership role, which isn't something most young people my age can experience, especially when working with adults."

In 2017 Rose, Will, Karen and Michael helped clean up and map out large-scale flood debris that had accumulated on Poplar Island. This project was a team effort by the Friends and Alberta Parks, and an event that stood out for Rose. "Our favourite volunteer experience as a family was the day we operated the 'ferry' to transport other volunteers to Poplar Island to map flood debris," she said, "It was more physically demanding than we anticipated but it was also so much fun to explore the 'forbidden zone' of Poplar Island. We found a Geocache that had been placed in Riverbend by a Cub Scout group and after figuring out where it came from, we had the pleasure of going with Julia Millen (AEP Liaison) to one of their meetings to return it."

In recognition of their volunteer contributions, Michael and Karen received the Alberta Parks and Protected

Areas Junior Achievement Award at the 2017 Alberta Parks Volunteer Conference. "Volunteering is something I have done my entire life, and I'm trying to continue volunteering while at university." Karen said, "Partly because it's just what I do, but also because I always get something out of volunteering, even if it's only a sense of having done something productive. Volunteering isn't just work. It can be a reason to go outside, to meet people, even to try something new and relaxing. My favourite volunteer activity has probably been the Riparian Restoration program, because it is just such a neat thing to do. I always enjoy projects that make a noticeable and immediate difference."

Through all of their volunteer projects, the Ratliffes are not only benefitting Fish Creek Provincial Park, but are also strengthening their family as Michael and Karen begin to find their own respective paths. To the readers of this newsletter Rose would like to share the message, "When it comes to volunteering, you don't need to jump in at the deep end like we did (our family motto seems to be if it is worth doing, it is worth overdoing). If you are even a little bit interested in giving back and helping out, then find a project that works for you and sign up. You will find other wonderful volunteers, incredibly appreciative staff and an immense sense of satisfaction at helping out your park. And just maybe you will find yourself signing up for at least one more project."

PROGRAM SEASON UPDATE

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE FRIENDS' SUMMER

With the arrival of fall comes the end to many of our programs, while others are in their final days. It was another beautiful and busy summer, with many new and interesting developments that stood out for us that we'd like to share.

In May we kicked off our 4th annual *Capture Nature Photography Contest* and provided the public with the ability to view photo submissions in the new <u>on-line gallery</u> for the very first time! We also walked alongside participants during two sold-out Good Grief programs, wrapping up in June with inspirational performances by the <u>Bridge to Peace Threshold Choir</u>. Our Good Grief participants continue to meet each Tuesday night for self-directed walks in the park, and we are excited to start planning the new Good Grief routes in 2019.

June saw the return of our yoga and Spring Forest Qi Gong sessions for the 6th year of our Wellness program. We were thrilled to welcome our newest instructor, Divya Singh, and her offering of meditation sessions in August. Two combo classes that combine yoga, meditation and Qi Gong in an extended format - which we refer to as a "Superclasses"- were also offered, with one being a special dedication class intended to send positive energy to those affected by the BC wildfires.

During the Spring and Summer, our Weed Whacker volunteers were busy addressing different species of invasive plants in areas that are somewhat localized and where manual pulling is still an effective control strategy. Our efforts were concentrated at the ATCO Heritage Grassland to help ensure the native grasses have the opportunity to become well established. In addition to our own volunteers, we were blessed to have groups from the Calgary Drop In and Rehabilitation Centre and Care West Innovative Health Care regularly work in the grassland. These volunteers contributed to a visible and significant reduction in the abundance of weeds over the summer.

Our public education programs expanded this year through the addition of new walking and minibus tours, along with the development of a volunteer training program that resulted in a handful of new Guides and Tour Assistants. These developments will ensure that our tours can be offered to the public on a more regular basis and on a greater number of topics, thereby contributing to the program's long-term sustainability.

In another effort to expand our education programming and ensure that our programs are accessible to all, concentrated efforts were made to promote our Youth Nature Programs to New Canadians and groups that are financially marginalized. These efforts allowed us to engage young people from the <u>Calgary Urban Project Society (CUPS)</u>, <u>Metis Calgary Family Services</u>, the <u>Iraqi Social Club of Alberta</u> and the <u>CNIB Foundation</u>.

We are only able to engage the public to the degree that we do through the support of our community partners, members, donors, funders and incredibly dedicated and talented army of volunteers. We are grateful for the energy and efforts that others contribute to our work in Fish Creek Provincial Park to make what we do possible!

REWILDING IN FISH CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK

As we enter the fall season, the Friends are focussing our efforts on "ReWilding" through our riparian restoration projects. Riparian areas are transition zones between land and water that are characterized by waterloving plant species such as willows, dogwood and balsam poplar; they are incredibly rich

in biodiversity and provide important ecosystem services including drought and flood mitigation when they are functioning well. However, Fish Creek Provincial Park is a well-loved and highly visited place, and this can result in degraded areas along the creek that negatively impact the system's ability to function well. Our Re-Wilding projects are designed to help mitigate the negative impacts of human use in the park, thereby increasing flood resiliency and recovery following high water or flood events.

Riparian Stewards are volunteers who take on different tasks involved in this work, such as scarifying (breaking up) soil, digging out invasive weeds, planting native shrubs and trees, spreading native plant seed and erecting protective fences to close off the restoration sites. Each year we depend on dozens of volunteers to help execute these projects and this year we are excited to be working with volunteers in the new role of



Riparian Monitoring Steward.
These Stewards have been trained by the Alberta Riparian Habitat Management Society (also known as Cows and Fish) to complete riparian health assessments that will be used to help us prioritize and plan our restoration projects for the coming years. They are currently

assessing the health of a one-kilometer stretch of Fish Creek, directly west of Bridge 11 and have chosen our new restoration sites based on these reports!

Our ReWilding field work is taking place during the week of October 15. Check out our website for more information about this program!

FISH CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK DAY USE AREA UPDATE

Bebo Grove Day Use Area

The road down into Bebo Grove (24 St SW) is currently closed. The City of Calgary is building a traffic circle and Bus Rapid Transit station at 24 St and Woodpark Blvd SW. Construction started in June and will continue until further notice. This is part of a larger City project improving storm water drainage in the communities north of Bebo Grove. The road will likely open up after the circle is complete and close some months later so the city can install a large storm water pipe under the road from Woodpark down into the park. During the construction phases, the field east of the Bebo Grove parking lot will be developed into wetlands and a picnic area.

The Bebo Grove Day Use washroom is closed during this time. Portable toilets are located near the washroom building. The closure does not affect the pathway system at Bebo. Stream Changes Trail

Everyone Belongs Outside: Alberta Parks' Inclusion Strategy (2014) recognizes physical and cultural barriers to accessing and enjoying Alberta's provincial parks system. It considers ways to improve access, invite participation and increase capacity. As part of "improving access," Parks audited park sites across Alberta, looking for places to offer a 1 km barrier-free experience. Seven were chosen, including one right here in Fish Creek Provincial Park!

The Stream Changes Trail (pictured above), just south of the Friends of Fish Creek office, is now fully accessible and barrier-free. You might have seen crews at work widening and repaving the trail, and replacing handrails along sloped sections of the trail (for example, at the approach to the bridge). Work should finish in October



and is weather dependent. Come out and explore the "new" trail and enjoy the beauty of the fall colours along Fish Creek.

Lafarge Meadows Day Use access

The 194 Avenue access at the south end of Lafarge Meadows is currently closed (until the end of November). The avenue is being upgraded by West Creek Developments to City of Calgary roadway standards. In the meantime, you can still enjoy the area by walking in from the north (starting from the Boat Launch), or by foot from Chaparral Valley Drive.

Flood Recovery Work

In 2017, volunteers helped remove 10 tonnes of nonnatural flood debris from FCPP. A further 18 tonnes (mapped by volunteers) was removed by a contractor from Poplar Island, a special preservation island in the park. In 2018, flood debris clean-ups continued in Lafarge Meadows and Rotary Nature Park at the south end of FC. Thanks to the Friends of Fish Creek, corporate volunteers, school groups and community volunteers, enough flood debris was removed to fill a medium-sized dumpster. Depending on weather, the remaining materials (mapped by volunteers) are scheduled for clean-up by a contractor in November, since they are too large or hazardous for removal by hand.

THE FISH CREEK BIRD BLIND

Fish Creek Provincial Park is home to over 200 different bird species, ranging from the ever-present chickadee to sandpipers, blue herons and even pelicans. Birding is one

of the most popular activities in the park, and birding enthusiasts come from all around the city for opportunities to catch a glimpse or photo of whatever they are lucky enough to see. This year, a new addition to the park will contribute to the already amazing birding experience in the park!

Several years ago, the Friends were approached by members of the birding community about the possibility of building a bird blind in the park. These structures provide places for people to "hide" and watch birds without disturbing them, so the birds are less likely to be scared away. Traditional blinds are usually small wooden buildings with four walls, a roof and lateral viewing windows. The Friends were supportive of the idea and agreed to bring it to the attention of Alberta Parks staff. Whilst Parks staff also supported this new venture in the park, the traditional design was deemed unsuitable as it presented some risks identified by Parks Conservation Officers:

- The structure could not be made of wood (due to flammability)
- · It should not be easily climbable (for safety reasons)
- · It could not be enclosed by walls or have a roof (could encourage people to set up camp).

The Friends helped locate a design used at the East Point Bird Sanctuary in Toronto, this was presented to Parks staff and approved. Several Friends of Fish Creek birding volunteers advised on the number, size and location of viewing windows; there are eight windows at varying heights, the lowest of which are at a height

suitable for young children, viewers who may want to bring a folding chair and sit for a while, or those who use a wheelchair.

The original site proposed was on the berm of the engineered wetland just north of Stoney Trail on the park road that leads to Lafarge Meadows. This location was turned down by The City of Calgary (the authority responsible for all the engineered wetlands in the park) as the berm was not designed to support a structure so our birding volunteers came up with an alternative location, these same volunteers also secured some funding from Nature Calgary to help make the project possible.

The blind was built over the winter and erected in March; it can be found in the east end of the park near the Burnsmead wetlands. It is a steel structure that functions as a blind but is also quite unique-looking, bringing a bit of "art" to the park.

Signage for the structure is currently in development. If you are going to visit the blind, we ask that you park in the Burnsmead lot and walk east, parallel to the road, to reach it. It is against Park regulations to park along the roadway. Also, please remember - no matter how enticing it might be to do so - it is also illegal to feed wildlife in a Provincial Park, and this includes birds.

Our thanks to Steve Sozniuk of Refining MetalWorks for his technical and creative skill in building this new structure, members of the Birding Community for their input and direction related to the final design and to Alberta Environment and Parks for their openness to this idea, the first of its kind in the park.

As this is an entirely new feature in the park the Friends will be reaching out to the community with a function and use survey later in the fall to gather feedback for other potential bird blind installations in the park.

Which provincial park located south west of Calgary recently received a pledge of \$3 million for upgrades from the provincial government?

Castle Wildland and Castle Provincial Park will receive these funds for back country huts, trail development and other facilities in order to preserve these parks and increase tourism. Castle Wildland Provincial Park covers an area of approximately 797 km² from the Crowsnest Pass to Waterton Lakes National Park along the BC border. Castle Provincial Park to the north east of the Wildland, covers 255 km². These new parks were proposed in September 2015, and in 2016 AEP began consulting with stakeholders, First Nations, municipalities, user groups, and scientists about the development of these parks. In January of 2017 these areas received designation as Alberta Provincial Parks.
