Invasive plant species may look appealing and even have useful qualities on the surface, but when introduced to a new environment, they have the potential to disperse and take over. Without predatory species to combat invasive species, they will alter vegetation, wildlife, and the natural beauty of native ecosystems. Invasive alien plants, both terrestrial and aquatic, are recognized worldwide as one of the major threats to biodiversity second only to urbanization. During this challenging and uncertain time, we will strive to keep you informed about our operations and how we are moving forward.

Our staff is mainly working from home and the office is being used occasionally by one staff member present at a time in order to adhere to physical distancing guidelines. It is because of our excellent IT support that we can work remotely, access our network, and keep in touch with volunteers, members, supporters and other community members.

Our diverse funding sources and the continuous support of community members have enabled us to maintain our full staff and continue with daily operations. Fiscal responsibility by our administration staff and Board of Directors in recent years have prepared us for the

financial challenges and economic disruption caused by Covid-19.

While we have cancelled some programs, others are going ahead, such as the annual Photography Contest (see page 5). In April we started using Zoom Video Conferencing technology to host meetings, deliver programs like the Fish Creek Speaker Series “Energize with Grizzlies” presentation, Take a Calm Break free meditation session, and the Annual General Meeting. Thank you to everyone who joined us on these sessions.

We have also reached out to community members through regular email communications to raise awareness about local businesses who have supported us in the past. This is a new approach for the Friends and one way we can give back to the Fish Creek community and help support the local economy.

These times are challenging for everyone and taking care of your physical, mental, spiritual and emotional health are essential to helping alleviate stress and boosting immunity. WE FOUND A STEWARDSHIP TRUCK!

In the fall, we told you about our need to find a truck to carry out our stewardship projects. We now have a truck and are so grateful for the support we received!



Although we were heartened and grateful by these offers, unfortunately neither of these trucks fit our needs.

As we all know, it's dry in southern

A truck is essential for our restoration and stewardship projects in this park. Many of our Watershed Stewardship Programs like Riparian Restoration and Tree Wrapping require the use of a vehicle to haul equipment and supplies to and from work sites.

Up until recently, we have relied on Alberta Parks vehicle use and staff for transportation of tools, equipment, watering and other tasks. This support may not be available in the future and securing our own vehicle has ensured that we are now able to continue our stewardship work in the park.

Thank you to everyone who donated to the truck campaign! We have surpassed our goal of \$10,000 and have now raised over \$10,260! Special thanks to Starbucks Canada Charitable Fund, held at Vancouver Foundation, for their generous contribution towards our goal.

So many community members showed their support by donating, and two families even stepped forward to donate a truck!

Alberta, so it is essential that we water our newly-planted trees and shrubs in our restoration sites. Therefore, we needed a truck that could haul a full water tank, watering equipment and people. And water is heavy, so a big truck with a big payload was necessary.

In February, a member of the Fish Creek community, the owner of Calgary-based In-Line Pigging Solutions, saw a poster about our need and decided to donate the truck. Through his generous donation, we now have a Dodge Ram 5500 with a crew cab and a flatbed. Although this truck might be a touch heavier duty than necessary, it certainly will do the trick, and the crane might come in handy for loading our water tank, rolls of wire and other heavy equipment!

find yourself taking a walk in Bowmont Park, you may come across a sign marking the original family homestead that has been restored as a natural park.

Emma loves the rich history of Calgary, and currently resides in the historic neighborhood of Ramsay, which is ideally situated between the Bow and Elbow Rivers, the Inglewood Bird Sanctuary, and perhaps most importantly, six local breweries.

Originally from Saskatoon, she worked in the pharmaceutical industry before raising a family. In recent years she has enjoyed being a grandparent and volunteer.

With the Friends of Fish Creek Jennifer has lent her expertise and abilities to a great many programs, courses and events, including Creekfest, Kids Bird Camp, Birding Course, Youth Nature programs, Invasive Species removal, Restoration and Good Grief, just to name few.

When asked why she started volunteering, Jennifer replied, “to give back, and because I could. The Friends of Fish Creek makes it so easy, the volunteer tasks are always interesting, enjoyable, and worthwhile.”

Jennifer discovered the Friends of Fish Creek after participating in the popular Birding Course. “I saw the Friends’ Birding Course advertised in a community newsletter. “I started getting news about volunteer opportunities through the Friends,” she said. “I stepped up to help lead Birding Courses after a few years as a participant because they needed people and I was there anyways. Fish Creek is very welcoming to its volunteers.

“One of my most rewarding volunteer activities is helping with the bird groups,” she said, “for the

inspiration of its founding instructors, the enthusiasm of the participants, the collegiality of fellow leaders, the support of Friends staff, and the sheer joy of being out there walking, listening, and noticing nature.”



“Watching the Friends practice good environmental stewardship at all their events has made me more conscious of my own choices,” she stated. Through volunteering with the Friends, Jennifer discovered other opportunities to appreciate nature. “Meeting Gus Yaki through the Friends’ Birding Courses led to joining his walk across southern Alberta in 2017 to raise funds and awareness for bird research and habitat conservation,” she said, “It was a truly amazing experience!”

“Balancing public engagement and conservation mandates, so people can experience nature first hand without loving our park ‘to death’ will continue to be a challenge for the Friends,” Jennifer said, “Riparian restoration projects are one example of this. The Friends has a role in raising awareness about responsible use of the park. Working to keep invasive non-native plants out of the ATCO Heritage Grassland area is another example of trying to preserve and restore an ecosystem under pressure from the immediate surrounding area.”

WRRP – The Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program is provided by Alberta Environment and it has supported our ReWilding through Restoration environmental stewardship activities. Last fall we worked with volunteers to reduce the impact of park visitors on the riparian areas along the creek by installing fencing and signage, planting willows and other restoration activities, in order to reclaim and restore these sensitive areas.



LSC – Through the Watershed Stewardship Grant, funded by Alberta Environment and Parks, Land Stewardship Centre of Canada provided much needed funding for both the tree mapping project which began last year, as well as for the rock dam research project. The rock dam research project was conducted by a student who also delivered a Fish Creek Speaker Series presentation in October, and was featured in the Friends’ and BRBC newsletter.



United Nations Association in Canada - The Canada Green Corps and Green Spaces programs provided funding which enabled us to hire a temporary part time staff in the position of Citizen Science & Stewardship Coordinator last year and at the beginning of this year.



BRBC – The Bow River Basin council is a long time partner and supporter of the Friends of Fish Creek and they recently provided funding for the Friends’ Watershed Stewardship program, which includes activities and events like invasive species management, community outreach and restoration.



City of Calgary – The City of Calgary is supporting our ReWilding work in Fish Creek through a new grant, with projects to be completed in June. The Friends and The City continue to collaborate and find new ways to enhance our partnership for the benefit of this truly amazing natural area.

STEWARDSHIP MESSAGE

PLEASE DO NOT FEED THE BIRDS

Fish Creek Provincial Park is a natural refuge for a high diversity of bird species; in the midst of our bustling, growing city, it provides food, shelter and nesting grounds for these creatures, that would otherwise be difficult for them to find anywhere else in the area.



some people continue to do so, even if they know it is illegal.

Feeding birds, or any other wild animal, in a Provincial Park can contribute to habituation, meaning that they lose their fear of people. When wild animals lose this fear and

Over 200 bird species have been observed in the park in recent years, from those we are all familiar with – like the Red-winged Blackbird or Great Horned Owl – to many we are unlikely to have heard of before, such as a Cinnamon Teal, Double-crested Cormorant or Ruby-crowned Kinglet. Did you know that Peregrine Falcons have been seen in the park? Or that nine different species of Woodpecker have also been observed? Some stay here year round, while others use it as a place of rest during the spring and fall migration, which means that, as the seasons change, so do the opportunities to see something amazing!

With this in mind, it is no surprise that birding is one of the most popular recreational activities in Fish Creek Provincial Park, as many people take advantage of this natural asset and its ability to support so many wide-ranging species. It is common throughout the year – yes, even in the winter! – to see groups of people staring up at the treetops and sky, seeking out their latest find, kitted out with binoculars and cameras to help them better capture the experience. And while we know it is tempting to bring along bird seed to attract them closer, in order to get a better look, this is a prohibited activity in all of Alberta's Provincial Parks, including Fish Creek. Unfortunately, feeding birds has increasingly become a problem in the park, and

come to associate people with food, this puts everyone at risk. Animals can lose their natural drive to search for food, expecting it to come to them as hand outs, and this can impact their very survival. Bird seed left on the ground can also attract many other creatures who enjoy it, such as mice, deer and yes, even bears. It can attract animals to areas frequented by people, increasing the likelihood of an undesired animal-human interaction, or leading them nearer to pathways and roads where they can be injured.

We all need to remember that everything is connected, and that often times there are unanticipated consequences to our actions, even if our intentions are well-meaning. Birds have an incredible resource in the park, and need to be able to fend for themselves, letting nature take its course, in whatever way that looks. **So, please support us by being a good steward of the park, observe birds and other wildlife from a distance, and help to educate others who may not be aware of the harm they may be causing by feeding birds.**

We invite you to spend some time in the glorious spring sunshine, exploring the park and learning about birds. You can also use the [Fish Creek Provincial Park Bird Checklist](#) any time, to see what you can find!

QUIZ ANSWER - WINTER ISSUE
The Brick pathway was one of the Friends' 25th Anniversary projects organized in 2017. Can you name one of the other five Anniversary projects?

In 2017, the Friends celebrated our 25th year of bringing the community and the park together. Our office was renovated and now has a functional kitchen and entranceway, electrical, lights and window coverings (1), as well as new signage and an informative kiosk (2). Long time Friends supporter and local artist Jim Pescott painted an image of Fish Creek Provincial Park in his signature pointillism style and provided the Friends the rights to use the painting for awareness and fundraising (3). We worked with volunteers on a survey to better understand our role and to make improvements to meet the needs of the community (4). The rewilding streambank restoration program has become one of the Friends' most impactful volunteer activities (5). These projects helped the Friends to celebrate our first 25 years and set a good foundation for the next 25 years!
