Speaker Series Returns to Fish Creek ELC

We are so happy to announce that the Fish Creek Speaker Series is returning to the Fish Creek Environmental Learning Centre for the 2022/2023 season, and in an even more accessible format!

For over 15 years , the Fish Creek Speaker Series (FCSS) has been bringing in professionals from a variety of fields to share their knowledge and experiences. Although education is a key goal, the original intention of the series was to bring Friends' members together regularly to build relationships and community.

The pandemic showed us the power of the internet to bring people together who might not otherwise be able to gather. Now we are putting technology to work to increase accessibility for audience members who may not be able to attend in person, and so we can bring in presenters from further afield.

For most of this year's scheduled presentations, community members will have the choice of either attending in person or tuning in remotely. For a select few of this year's events (mostly in the darker winter months), we have arranged geographically-distant speakers, and so those events will take place on the virtual platform only (no in person event).

We are working to maximize accessibility for all, whether attending these talks in person or online. For



those who choose to attend in person at the Fish Creek Environmental Learning Centre (ELC), hand sanitizer and masks will be available and chairs will be spaced a bit further apart than usual.

We understand that for many, the option of tuning in online from home may continue to be the most accessible option. With support from the Canadian Hard of Hearing Association's Calgary Chapter, the Spring 2022 Fish Creek Speaker Series online events featured live captioning to improve accessibility for all, including those who are hard of hearing or deaf, and also for those who prefer visual stimuli.

BEAVER COEXISTENCE

SUCCESSFULLY COEXISTING WITH BEAVERS IN FISH CREEK!

It's been over two years since the Province of Alberta's Watershed Restoration and Resiliency Program (WRRP) accepted our application to fund the first Beaver Coexistence Project in Fish Creek, and we're continuing to foster coexistence with our furry friends across the Fish Creek Valley.

This new initiative aimed to both alleviate pathway flooding in an area where beaver activity was causing

Photo, Rose Ratliffe This summer, our youngest Beaver Coexistence Volunteer, Himanshu Sangale, secured a grant to support the installation of an additional flow control device in the wetlands between Sikome and the Bow River. This project successfully engaged youth from the Canadian Wildlife Federation's Wild Outside and Canadian Conservation Corps programs.

Coming up this fall, we will

severe pathway flooding and damage, while protecting the animals and their habitat so they can thrive and be the ecosystem engineers, water filtration experts and landscape artists that they are.

Thanks to the WRRP, project partners and our dedicated and skilled Beaver Coexistence Volunteers, the project has included the installation of five flow control devices in the area between Bebo Grove and Marshall Springs. The devices have successfully alleviated pathway flooding and only a few maintenance outings have been needed to keep the devices operational. The initial project engaged over 200 people, including land managers from nearby jurisdictions and members of the general public, highlighting the benefits beavers bring to the ecosystem.

be establishing the Beaver Tales interpretive trail starting at Bebo Grove. The trail will guide visitors on a 2km paved loop where they can learn fascinating things like the cultural significance of beavers to the area's Indigenous cultures, and also try new things, such as hunting for beaver-felled trees that have resprouted, and looking at decaying logs in a new light.

To maximize accessibility for new Canadians, each sign will have a QR code that directs visitors to a webpage where the sign content can be found in many languages. The webpage will also feature an auditory clip for those with vision challenges. Stay tuned to your email for information about the Grand Opening of this new, accessible learning opportunity in the park. We look forward to strolling the trail with you!



will continue to learn and develop our own skills through engaging our expert partners, and evolve our Citizen Science programs to engage more volunteers in higher levels and new roles. Summer Stewardship Update

Summer is an exciting time of the year for restoration. It's the result of all the planning made during the previous autumn when the last season ended. The number of triumphs and learning opportunities increase each time we step out into the field, and this restoration season has been no different. Below are some of the highlights from the summer 2022 season.

The Friends kicked off the summer with a significant amount of poplar planting early in the season. I was very impressed with how many people came to help us plant trees in the park in May and June. We planted 333 trees all of which were mapped out on ArcGIS with the help of the mapping, monitoring, and maintenance volunteers.

Riparian Health Assessments were performed this year to improve the park and locate the areas of the park in greatest need of restoration. This year we continued to survey the area between Votier's Flats and Macleod Trail with our volunteers.

Twice a week throughout the summer the watering crew has been spraying the new plantings at the restoration sites. Even in the excessive heat this summer, our plantings have a really good chance for survival thanks to the watering crew's efforts.

Finally, the new flow control device near Sikome , which was planned as far back as April, was installed in August. Volunteers spent over 100 combined hours on the installation of this device. The new flow control device has improved the park by lowering the level of water near the pathway. It will also help keep the beavers in place, thus protecting trees in other areas of the park. Healthy trees in the Sikome area were also wrapped to discourage beavers from chewing on them. *See page 6 for more info about this project.*

Each season we strive to keep improving our programs so we can continue improving the park. Every time someone comes out to volunteer with us, they lend themselves to a story of restoration, one that is written in the height of trees yet to grow.

QUIZ ANSWER - SUMMER ISSUE

In what year did the Friends launch the Beaver Coexistence project and in what area of the park did this program focus?

Answer: The Beaver Coexistence project was launched in 2020. The focus of the project was to develop ways to mitigate the impact that beavers can have on park infrastructure, with a focus on the Marshall Springs area where beavers had been very active. The Beaver Coexistence project also helps to raise awareness within the community about the positive effects of beavers on the larger environmental scale.
