CONSERVATION UPDATE

RESTORATION IN FISH CREEK

Through the fall, with a lot of help from our volunteers, the Friends staff work to install restoration sites along the creek. These sites are fenced, mapped, planted, mulched, watered, and cared for through the season until wintertime. You might find that these sites have an impact on where you can visit the creek, seeing as how they limit access with the fences, but the impact that the sites can have

from an ecological perspective far outweighs the inconvenience of more difficult creek access.

Erosion control first comes to mind when talking about Fish Creek Provincial Park. Many of our trails in the park follow the flow of the creek and subsequently could be damaged by an eroding bank. This has the knock-on effect of creating the need for new trails in the area to compensate for unsafe conditions on trails close to the creek. These new trails could cause more damage to the vegetation in the area though compacting the earth and trampling new growth. These trails in turn could lead to more erosion as less plants are then present to hold the bank in place when the creek comes to wash out the next bit of land. By installing restoration sites in strategic spots, plants can be allowed to flourish down close to the water, helping hold the bank in during both regular spring flooding and larger flood events. In a few years, the bank is stable enough that park visitors will be able to appreciate the site without the need for the fence.

Flooding is something that is also helped by denser vegetation next to the creek. Any time the creek rises above its normal bounds, plants around the edge of the water system help to slow the flow of the water and increase the amount of water that the land can absorb.



This means less intense flooding downstream of the creek any time there's a major event, and more benefit derived from regular high flow in the spring. To get these benefits requires revegetation of areas that previously had very few plants to take advantage of flood phenomena. Our goal with the sites is to add plants back to places experiencing the deleterious effects of low vegetation. By building restorations sites, we can make sure water going through the park does so as slowly as possible so that the park can benefit as much as possible from the presence of water.

More plants along the creek can also help prevent drought. Vegetation that shades the creek helps slow the evaporation of water from the creek during the hot, dry days of summer. While this effect takes some time to be effective, it goes to prove how planning as long as possible into the future can have an impact on the creek's water. This effect is less direct but can still have an impact on the way that water moves through the landscape. Another way that having more plants along the creek helps is by providing food for beavers.

Beavers have a tremendous impact on the creek's water supply. They can double the holding capacity of a body of water simply by building dams and digging out channels.

By making sure that Fish Creek continues to be a home for beavers fifty or more years in the future, we can ensure that the creek is as drought proof as it can be by increasing the amount of water in the creek.

encouraging human visitors to respect the vegetation near the edge of the creek, both can be accomplished. This serves to illustrate just how important it is to protect trees and plants next to the creek pathways. Since those are the areas where we need the most shade, it's important to be as careful as possible in these areas. Staying on the designated pathways and respecting restoration sites are the easiest ways to make sure that Fish Creek Provincial Park stays as wonderful in the future as it is now. Being a part of this strategy is important to ensure that the investments we make now have the highest impact possible. The other part of the strategy is completed through many of our project partners including the City of Calgary, the Watershed Resiliency and Restoration Program, and Alberta Forestry and Parks. With the help of our partners and volunteers, we install restoration sites to make sure that we are doing our part as a community organization to protect the park.

Providing more shade over the water and food for beavers at the same time sounds like a contradiction. However, by encouraging beaver activity away from areas that have human infrastructure, and by

Grassland Update

SOIL SOLARISATION PROGRESS

In 2022, we created two solarisation patches west of the ATCO Heritage Grassland at the Bow Valley Ranch. Solarisation kills invasive smooth brome by forcing the seed bank to germinate, and then suffocating seedlings under greenhouse plastic. This spring, the plastic was removed, and all dead

yarrow, coneflower, fleabane and harebells gave us delightful blooms and have now also turned

nurtured by diligent volunteers who came out to water, weed and build irrigation systems for the plots. By August, much of the grass seed had germinated, matured, and began producing its own seed. Similarly, while many of the forbs focus on developing strong root systems this year, the yarrow, coneflower, fleabane and harebells gave us delightful blooms and have now also turned to seed.

thatch underneath was raked up to prepare a clean soil substrate perfect for sowing native seed. In May of 2023, these patches of bare soil were seeded with a native grass seed mix containing Canada wild rye, green needle grass, June grass, Western porcupine grass, Northern wheat grass, Sandberg bluegrass and Idaho fescue. We then planted 900 Foothills rough fescue seedling plugs, and 900 mixed grassland forb plugs like



prairie coneflower, wild bergamot, harebells, stiff goldenrod, prairie fleabane, yarrow, blanket flower and more. During the summer months, seedlings were

COWS AND FISH HELPING TO EXPAND ATCO GRASSLAND

In 2021, Cows and Fish (The Alberta Riparian Management Society) performed a Rangeland Health Assessment on the ATCO Heritage Grassland. The grassland was given a score of 63%, assessed as "healthy, with problems," with main concerns coming from invasive species like smooth brome, Canada thistle, yellow toadflax and other noxious weeds. The assessment recommended managing smooth brome surrounding the 0.5-hectare plot, to ensure native grasses were not outcompeted by the strong agronomic grass remaining from when the Bow Valley Ranch was an active ranch.

GRASSLAND UPDATE CONT'D

Following this advice, we expanded the site to 6-hectares, mowed, raked and re-seeded with the custom seed mix prepared by Eastern Slopes Rangeland Seeds (Tannas Conservation Services Ltd.). Cows and Fish returned in 2023 to help with the restoration process and document our management of the site. We will perform another Rangeland Health Assessment next year, to evaluate our interim success of the expanded grassland restoration project.

NATIVE SEED SALVAGE WITH GENESIS LAND DEVELOPMENT CORP.

Genesis Land Development Corp. granted the Alberta Native Plant Council the opportunity to hold a native plant seed harvest at their Logan Landing development, immediately south of the community of Seton in Calgary. Friends of Fish Creek volunteers harvested around 5 kg of native grass and forb seeds including dotted blazing star, stiff goldenrod, stiff sunflower, prairie and fringed sage, smooth blue aster, blue grama

season this year and spread more seed over our grassland sites in October. Silky lupine and purple prairie clover were two of my personal favorite seeds collected, as they both are important legumes, making nitrogen available to be taken up by other plants. We are looking forward to future access to harvest seed at this site to enhance our capacity to restore native grasslands in Fish Creek. Thank you Genesis for this great opportunity!

Phase 3 of the Fish Creek Community Terrace

POPLAR RESCUE WITH VOLUNTEERS

For the past three years, the Friends of Fish Creek have run a volunteering event to rescue stranded balsam poplars out of our managed grassland spaces near the Bow Valley Ranch, and bring them to our native plant garden. After a brief stay to ensure their health, the trees are then planted into our project areas in the park. This helps preserve the park's ecology by transplanting trees out of an area where they would otherwise need to be destroyed. We save not only the expense of a new tree, but also the energy that the tree put into growing in the first place. Through

events like these, we hope to encourage community members to respect the natural spaces around them as well as inspire them to take part in keeping Fish Creek Provincial Park a beautiful place.



On August 8, several volunteers and their families helped out with a Poplar Rescue project. Below are some messages we received from them shortly after the event.

I just wanted to thank you all again for such an amazing



experience! We had a great time in nature. It was such a meaningful experience for our kids to explore nature in a way they don't usually get to. Getting to experience taking a part of caring of the park by digging the soil, taking those poplar seedlings and transferring to their nursery, and to know that the park we enjoy is kept well thanks to your care and efforts was such an invaluable experience!

The interaction with the staff and volunteers of Friends of Fish Creek was a blessing as well. My daughter and I enjoyed the conversation with them, and

learned that poplars need to be planted near water, new baby trees come out from a root of its parent tree, how many years a poplar usually lives, and more. My daughter told me that she was especially amazed to know that a root can grow even when it's cut really short, and the tree will continue living and

growing.

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POPLAR RESCUE WITH VOLUNTEERS CONT'D

We were helping Fish Creek by helping move young trees to where they were needed and where they could eventually thrive.

After the event, I felt that we had become a real part of the Fish Creek Provincial Park community. We went to the Visitor Centre and learned more about the history of the park. ALBERTA CHAMPIONS SOCIETY IN FISH CREEK PROVINCIAL PARK

Alberta Champions Society is pleased to present our newest "Field of Fame Seven" located in the Bow Valley Ranch area of Fish Creek Provincial Park. Alberta Champions Society was created to commemorate, recognize and honour those deserving Albertans who have made a significant lifetime contribution to our city and province. This is achieved by placing six monuments in a grouping, called a "Field of Fame" to provide special recognition of the very special individuals chosen. Alberta Champions has located "Fields of Fame" at seven strategic locations around Calgary in the past few years.

Alberta Champions recently unveiled the monuments for our newest champions at Field of Fame Seven in Fish Creek Provincial Park which include:

Gus Yaki who was a passionate naturalist and birder who is particularly remembered in Fish Creek Provincial Park for the birding classes he created. In 2017, at age 84 he led a walk across Southern Alberta from Saskatchewan to Waterton Park to celebrate Canada's 150th birthday, in support of bird study and habitat conservation.

Virnetta Anderson who was the first Black member of Calgary City Council and a leader in many community organizations.

Narcisse Blood who was a Blackfoot Traditional Spiritual Elder who was passionate about preserving and sharing traditional Blackfoot spiritual ways and cultural heritage.

Michael Green who was Co-Artistic Director and founding member of One Yellow Rabbit Performance Theatre. Michael was the significant force behind the establishment of the Making Treaty 7 Cultural Society



and Executive Producer/Creator of the Making Treaty 7 Production in 2012, assisted by Narcisse Blood.

Narcisse Blood and Michael Green died together while on a humanitarian mission of cultural healing in February 2015. They are recognized on the same monument as a symbol of reconciliation.

Roderick (Roddy) Mah who played a vital role in preserving Chinatown in Calgary as well as developing China-Canada business connections.

Chuck Mawer who was a decorated naval officer in WWII and later built the hugely successful firm of Mawer Investment Management.

Peter Prince who arrived in Calgary in 1886, built the Eau Claire and Bow River Lumber Mill along with many other businesses and created Prince's Island on the Bow River.

SHAW BIRDIES FOR KIDS PRESENTED BY ALTALINK



Thank you to everyone who donated towards Shaw Birdies for Kids presented by AltaLink this year. With your support, this year's campaign was the most successful to date. We had set our fundraising goal at \$25,000 and surpassed that to raise \$34,946 after the matching contribution by the Shaw Charity Classic Foundation. This funding will support an unforgettable day of learning for approximately an additional 3,494 Calgary students. If it were not for the Friends' and Alberta Forestry and Parks' Learning Naturally program, countless students would not be afforded a life-changing experience here in the natural splendour of Fish Creek.

Special thanks to the Greenfield Foundation, the Scott Sarjeant family, Elaine Barnes, Patricia Gail Jardine, and Tom Bamford with Platinum Racing for their most generous contributions which really elevated this fundraiser. In addition to these donors, twenty community members also donated in support of Learning Naturally.

Learning Naturally is run mainly out of the Fish Creek Environmental Learning Centre at Shannon Terrace in the far west end of Fish Creek and is available to select Calgary schools. Children between grades K - 6 enjoy learning about nature and conservation through curriculum-focused programs like Winter Wonder, Animals and Winter, Fish Creek Families, Wildlife Cycles, Fish Creek: Land, Histories & Stories and Orienteering.

Many of the Learning Naturally students are from families that are new to Canada and their field trip acts as not only their first visit to Fish Creek but their first visit to nature in this country. We are very proud of the Learning Naturally program and the difference it makes in the lives of thousands of children each year. It is through exceptional partnerships like the one we have with Birdies for Kids, that this program is able to continue.

This essential program does not receive regular funding and while we are very grateful for all the contributions to Learning Naturally, its continuation is in jeopardy. The Friends are seeking long term funding for this educational program.
