Seeds for next year's Listen Garden

It's almost December and you might be asking what sort of work the Friends of Fish Creek are up to when it's cold out, the days are short, and not much is growing. Well, our work actually continues year round, and we have the time once field season ends to reap the fruits of our labours - kind of literally! Through spring, summer, and fall, after you see beautiful blooms on all kinds of different species of native plants, those plants go to seed. And we're out there at plant salvages, in the park, and on land we've been given access to by our partners, harvesting those seeds to continue building species diversity within the park. After harvesting, our incredible volunteers gather weekly to help us separate the seeds from the chaff so that they're easily stored, measured, and perhaps most importantly, planted.

And this year, we've got a special purpose for all those seeds we're harvesting. The harvested seeds from 2025 are destined to go into the Listen Garden at Bow Valley Ranch – a space for native plants, Indigenous knowledge, and reconciliation. This area has been treated with herbicide to remove the invasive species that cover much of the park and prepare it for the cover crop (annual Plains coreopsis) and native seed mix we'll apply in spring. After one to two seasons, the Plains coreopsis will die, and the high-diversity native seed mix will emerge from below. To speed revegetation along, hundreds of large, salvaged mature plants like Foothills rough fescue, Parry's oatgrass, and Western porcupine grass will be planted in the spring alongside the seed mix.

The Listen Garden will also feature several "Habitat beds" that highlight Alberta's diverse ecosystems. Beds on the garden's west side will showcase alpine/montane, foothills parkland, and Foothills rough fescue grassland ecosystems, merging into the dry mixed grass and badlands ecosystems on the east side of the gardens. These more "formal" gardens will be installed in a few years. Right now, the space consists of contoured pathways – what isn't currently path will be home to thousands of tiny native plant seedlings.

I can't believe it's already been a year since my arrival at the Friends of Fish Creek Provincial Park Society. It is an honour and a privilege to work alongside such dedicated staff and volunteers, and to meet so many of our passionate supporters. This year has seen many notable successes, including salvaging over 45,000 native plants (\$350,000 value!) and over 15 kg of seeds for restoration projects like the Listen Garden. We also held a huge celebration for the 50th Anniversary of Fish Creek, invested in new staff positions, and worked with over 90 community partners to achieve our mission.

To say thank you to our community for all your support this year, we will be holding a free Open House event this Giving Tuesday (December 2, 2025) from 3pm – 8 pm at the Bow Valley Ranch Visitor Centre. We had tremendous success with this year's Roger's Birdies for Kids presented by AltaLink program! The first Fish Creek Fish Inventory in over 30 years

In late August this year, along with partner organizations Freshwater Conservation Canada, Fish Creek Watershed Association, Alberta Wilderness Association, Tsuut'ina Nation, we organized and carried out the first Fish Creek watershed scale Fish Inventory in over 30 years! This Fish Inventory was even more long-awaited as

it was delayed multiple times by unprecedented rainfall through July – needless to say, we were so ready to get out there and check out some fish by the end of August!

A Fish Inventory is a way to collect data on the fish species living in a specific watershed – it involves electrofishing (using a low live electric current) to temporarily stun fish so they can be easily netted, measured, catalogued, and released back to their natural habitat. The 2025 Fish Creek Fish Inventory surveyed 28 sites spanning from Priddis to close to the confluence of Fish Creek and the Bow River and found fish at all but one site.

This project was a huge undertaking with collaboration from all partners and required mobilizing multiple crews on each of the inventory days. A huge thank you goes out to everyone who took the time to volunteer and make this important survey happen, from Friends volunteers to partner organization volunteers and beyond.

We're still waiting for data analysis to be finalized from the survey's findings. Data is currently being entered and cleaned, and Freshwater Conservation Canada expects it will be ready for detailed analysis by

mid-December. Stay tuned for more information and detailed findings in the earlier parts of 2026! For now, we can share some overall observations and notes on species found during the survey.

Invasive species in the park: survey teams found Prussian carp throughout the park. This species is a recently introduced invasive that has spread to many Alberta watersheds.

Rosy red minnows were discovered at one site – these minnows have the potential to disrupt aquatic ecosystems and may have been introduced from intentional release of aquarium fish. Teams also discovered one large crayfish

at the west end of the park. Northern crayfish are native to the Beaver River watershed in Alberta but are invasive in the Fish Creek watershed.

Now, on to the exciting stuff! Among the native species found during the survey were longnose dace, lake chub, and pearl dace – all native minnows. We were also excited to find lots of suckerfish, species that use their sucker-like mouth to feed off the creek's bottom: white sucker, plains sucker, and longnose sucker. It's important that we found so many suckers in the creek because they are a good

indicator of the creek's health and show that it can

sustain a wide variety of fish. We also found at least one cutthroat trout, as well as mountain whitefish at one site. Mountain whitefish have an interesting feeding style where they stir up sediment with their fins to expose benthic invertebrates to feed on! Teams identified brook stickleback – a small freshwater fish with spines on their dorsal fins - at multiple sites throughout the park.

In terms of naturalized fish species, the survey identified brown trout, rainbow trout, and brook trout throughout the watershed. Brook trout were only found in the upper parts of the watershed.

Tree Wrapping Season

You may have noticed a whole lot more trees wrapped with wire cages in the park recently. This is because we've been focusing on protecting trees in key locations from beavers and other common threats. In some areas, we've been adding cages to suggest that the beavers move on to build dams on the creek instead of other more... interesting sites that tend to threaten infrastructure (like in storm water ponds!).

Tree wrapping at Bebo Grove and Marshall Springs will help to prevent future flooding in the area. The unprecedented amounts of rain this summer saw the beavers taking advantage of the storm water outflows below Marshall Springs to build a lot of dams along the canal – resulting in pathway flooding in quite a few places. Thanks to the help of our amazing volunteers, we went out many times this summer to remove these dams. Unfortunately, dam removal is only a temporary solution since beavers can rebuild their dams in a matter of days!

Our hope is that by wrapping the trees in the area near the canal we can encourage the beavers to move back into the creek where they provide plenty of benefits without flooding park infrastructure. Wrapping trees limits the beavers' food source – if there are no unwrapped trees, they'll need to head farther afield to find better lunch locations.

Part time Conservation and Restoration Technician Josh Gibbs has been doing an incredible job leading the tree wrapping (and unwrapping) charge at Mallard Point. Because of the high water table and protective wrapping, this area's poplar trees have seen rapid growth this year. Having a variety of trees across a range of ages benefits wildlife in a number of ways. Older dead trees provide great habitat for insects and birds like owls and woodpeckers, and younger and middle age trees are a food source for beavers, deer, and other herbivores. This is why we're continuing to plant poplars at this site to reflect the natural plant community in the area as well as wrapping across the park to preserve a variety of tree ages.

Many of the trees that were wrapped over 15 years ago have grown to the point they will need to be unwrapped or rewrapped. If these trees are not maintained, they will become girdled – where the wire grows into the tree and can, in extreme cases can kill the tree. When wrapping new trees, we try to use larger wire cages to allow for more growth and less future maintenance. Factors like tree health and how the area is being used influence whether a tree will be wrapped again after unwrapping.




Capture Nature Contest 2025

A big thank you goes out to The Camera Store, the Apothecary in Inglewood, and London Drugs for their generous support.


